THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

Schodack Central School District serves about 1,029 school children who reside in the 34-square-mile district which includes Schodack and a small part of Stuyvesant. The district has three school buildings. Castleton Elementary School, located on the corner of Scott and Campbell avenues in Castleton, has approximately 422 pupils in kindergarten through grade 5. Maple Hill Middle School, located on South Schodack Road, has approximately 227 students in grades 6 through 8. Maple Hill High School, located on Maple Hill Road, has approximately 380 students in grades 9-12.



BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education consists of nine community members elected to serve three-year terms of office without pay. The Board acts as a collective body to establish the policies under which the Schodack Central School District operates. The Superintendent of Schools is responsible for administering the school program within the context of these policies.

The Board holds meetings on the third Thursday of most months at 6 p.m. in the High School library. Please see this calendar or visit www.schodack.k12.ny.us for a list of meeting dates and locations. Board agendas and meeting minutes are also available online or by calling the district office at 732-2297.

The public is encouraged to attend Board meetings and share thoughts during the public comment period, which starts each meeting. Individuals who would like to speak are recognized by the Board president and asked to state their name. The Board and administration believe the community's input is critical to decision making. We strive to be as transparent as possible and strongly encourage our community to provide input whenever they have a question or concern.

ATTENDANCE

Good attendance is a central component of the educational process. The educational program offered by the Schodack Central School District is predicated upon student presence and requires continuity of instruction and classroom participation. This Board of Education attendance policy has been developed to ensure the district has an adequate record verifying attendance of all children in accordance with New York State Education Law. The attendance policy allows the district to examine patterns of pupil absence and develop effective intervention strategies to improve school attendance.

Excused and Unexcused Absences

Appropriate Grounds for Excused Absences or Tardiness: Students and their parents or guardians are responsible for providing written notification explaining the reason for absences upon the student's return to school. Whenever possible, parents or guardians are encouraged to contact the school in writing or by telephone prior to an absence. The following list represents legal and appropriate basis for student absence or tardiness from school: personal illness, sickness or death in family, medical appointments, court appearances, religious observance, quarantine, supervised education project, approved cooperative work program, military obligation, pre-approved college visits for high school juniors and seniors, and any other absence excused at the discretion of the superintendent.

Grounds for Unexcused Absences or Tardiness: Absence for any reason not included in the list above is an unexcused absence. Absences that are not pre-approved by the District or failure to provide an appropriate note or documentation within three school days of the student's return will also be recorded as an unexcused absence.

Parental requests excusing a student from school for reasons not included above (e.g. to take a driver's test, to get a hair cut, to go shopping, to go on a family trip, or not stating a specific reason) are unexcused absences under state law. Excuses that a student "overslept" or had "car trouble" are also unacceptable and constitute an unexcused absence or tardiness.

When Attendance Will Be Taken

Castleton Elementary School — Attendance is taken each morning at the beginning of the school day. Each classroom teacher will record students' presence or absence in a classroom record and will report all absence or tardiness to the nurse's office on an attendance report card.

Maple Hill Middle School — Attendance is taken in homeroom at the beginning of each day and all absence or tardiness will be reported to the building office on an attendance report form. Attendance will also be taken at the beginning of each period (block) of scheduled instruction. Each classroom teacher will record students' presence or absence in a classroom record and will report all unaccounted absence or tardiness to the building office.

Maple Hill High School — Attendance is taken at the beginning of the first period (block) of scheduled instruction and all absence or tardiness will be reported to the building office on an attendance report form. Attendance will also be taken at the beginning of all other periods (blocks) of scheduled instruction. Each classroom teacher will record students' presence or absence in a classroom record and will report all unaccounted absence or tardiness to the building office.

Contacting Parents

In the event a student is absent from school without a previous notification to the teacher or building principal, the school will call the student's home to confirm the student's absence. If no parent or guardian is home, the District will contact a parent or guardian at their place of employment or number listed on the student's emergency contact form.

In both situations, if contact is not made with a parent or guardian, a message will be left for the parent or person in parental relation to call the school immediately.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Providing children with a nutritious breakfast and lunch is one of the best ways to help them perform well in the classroom. Studies have shown that hungry children find it difficult to concentrate on schoolwork.

Students may purchase a complete lunch, milk, or a la carte and snack items. For a monthly menu, visit www.schodack.k12.ny.us. Lunch for Elementary students costs \$1.90. Lunch for Middle and High School students costs \$2.05. Breakfast for all grade levels costs \$1.00. Milk costs \$0.50.

Free lunches available: Did you know that your child may be eligible for a free or reduced breakfast and/or lunch? Students from households that meet federal income limits can qualify for the Free and Reduced Price Lunch Program. This is an absolutely confidential program. Students' Attendance Requirements: REWARDS, DISCIPLINE AND RECEIPT OF COURSE CREDIT

Rewards for Good Attendance — Any student who has perfect attendance is eligible for perfect attendance recognition. In addition, good attendance is a positive endorsement factor in any letter of recommendation written by a school employee.

Poor Attendance — Chronic absences and tardiness, whether excused or unexcused, are disruptive to the educational process. Make-up work will be assigned for excused and unexcused absences. Any student who is absent 10 or more days during a semester will be reviewed by the building's Child Study Team to determine whether or not intervention is necessary.

Course Credit — Attendance is not the sole criterion for denial of course credit or a promotion determination. Attendance is factored into the class participation component of the grading system.

Unexcused tardiness and absences will also subject a student to the range of penalties specified in the District's Code of Conduct. This policy will be made available to any member of the community upon request.

EMERGENCY SCHOOL CLOSINGS

In the event of an unplanned early dismissal or emergency closing, it is critical that the school district knows where to release your child. Parents of students in grades K-8 will receive a form to be completed in the early fall that asks for you to indicate one mechanism for releasing your child.

The school district will not honor any requests for another parent or relative to pick up your child in the event of an unplanned emergency that necessitates quick release of all students, faculty and staff. Please discuss with your child the emergency closing information and be sure that your child knows where he/she is to go in an unplanned emergency closing.

If an emergency arises and schools must be closed or the opening delayed, an announcement will be made on the school homepage, www.schodack.k12.ny.us. The following radio and TV stations are also officially designated to carry the announcements:

SCHOOLCONNECTS SYSTEM

SchoolConnects is the emergency contact system that will automatically dial up to three provided phone numbers to deliver a recorded message from the school to parents and guardians. The numbers in the system are those that parents provide on their children's emergency card. It is essential that these phone numbers be kept up-to-date. Please fill out and return your child's emergency contact card as soon as possible.

SchoolConnects will not be used to notify parents of weather delays or closings unless parents specifically request it; please visit the school website to sign up for this free service.

SchoolConnects will be used in the event of an early dismissal due to weather or other emergency conditions.

If an emergency arises during the school day, the closing will be announced on the same radio stations and the SchoolConnects Emergency Contact System will be activated.

All school activities, including Continuing Education classes, are cancelled if school is closed or closes early.

When it is necessary to delay school, there may be a few roads which will not have been sanded. The pick-up on these roads will be delayed until roads have been sanded or become safe because of rising temperatures.

Parents should not drop their children off before the later opening time because school may not be fully staffed.

Notice to Parents Regarding Student Records

This is to advise you of your rights with respect to school records relating to you or your child pursuant to the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Parents of a student under 18, or a student 18 or older, have a right to inspect and review any and all official records, files and data directly related to their child, including all material that is incorporated into each student's cumulative record folder, and intended for school use or to be available to parties outside the school or school system. This specifically includes, but is not necessarily limited to, identifying data, academic work completed, level of achievement (grades, standardized achievement test scores), attendance data, scores on standardized intelligence, aptitude and psychological tests, interest inventory results, health data, family background information, teacher or counselor rating and observations, and verified reports of serious or recurrent behavior patterns.

Such parents and students are also entitled to an opportunity for a hearing where they may be represented by counsel of their own choosing to challenge the content of such records, to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the Privacy Act or other rights of students, and to provide an opportunity for the correction or deletion of any such inaccurate, misleading or otherwise inappropriate data contained therein. Any questions concerning the procedure to be followed in requesting such a hearing should be directed to High School Principal Ron Agostinoni.

Student records, and any material contained herein which is personally identifiable and is confidential, may not be released or made available to persons other than parents or students without the written consent of such parent or student. There are a number of exceptions to this rule, such as other school employees and officials, who have a legitimate educational need or access to such records in the course of their employment.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The health and safety of our students, employees, volunteers and visitors is paramount. In response to the Safe Schools Against Violence in Education legislation, the Board of Education has adopted a Code of Conduct for students, District employees, and visitors to school property. A plain language summary of the Code of Conduct is distributed to all students at the start of the new school year and given to parents at each Parent Night. The Code of Conduct is also available in all building main offices as well as the District Office.

In addition to addressing the rights and responsibilities of students, District employees and visitors, the Code of Conduct also details how the District will respond to violations.

Any student who violates the Code of Conduct will be subject to an immediate and appropriate school response, which may include one or more of the following: warning, reprimand, parental notification, counseling, loss of privileges, compulsory restitution, temporary removal from class, detention, in-school suspension or suspension from school and/or police intervention, in accordance with provisions and proceedings of the Education Law.



DIRECTORY INFORMATION

What Education Law refers to as “directory information” may be made public for school purposes unless a parent informs us in writing that they do want this information public. Directory information that we may make public includes: a pupil's name, address, grade level, honor or award received, photograph, age, membership in a school athletic team, activity or club, and (for athletes only) height and weight. Directory information is primarily made public so that students' accomplishments can be included in various publications such as a concert program, yearbook, honor roll, district newsletter or school website.

MILITARY RECRUITERS & COLLEGES

According to federal law, the Schodack Central School District is required, upon request, to provide to military recruiters and institutions of higher education, such as colleges and universities, access to the names, addresses and telephone numbers of secondary school students enrolled in the District. You may request that your child's information not be released without prior written parental consent by making a written request to the school by October 1. A copy of the required form is available on the district website or you may request one from High School Principal Ron Agostinoni. Failure to return the form will result in your child's name being included on a list requested by any military recruiter and/or institution of higher learning.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Kindergarten registration forms are due at Castleton Elementary School in November. To be eligible for registration, a child must be 5 years old on or before Dec. 1. Kindergarten orientation takes place in May. At that time, you need to bring your child's birth certificate, proof of residency and proof of the required immunizations (measles, polio, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, mumps and hepatitis B). Results of your child's physical examinations are required to be submitted to the elementary school nurse before opening day in September.

SCHOOL BUDGET

One of the main duties the Board of Education is responsible for is preparing the annual school budget. First, the schools and various departments submit their budget requests, typically in January. The Board then holds a series of finance meetings to evaluate the requests.

The Board also solicits public input on the budget and devotes portions of its February and March public board meetings to the budget, where residents can ask questions. Community members can also join our Community Budget Advisory Team to learn about the budget process and provide options to the Board. Residents can follow the budget process on the district website, www.schodack.k12.ny.us, where summaries are posted. These summaries are also available at the district office.

In April, the Board votes on a proposed budget. A newsletter dedicated to explaining the budget is mailed to all district homes in early May. Copies of the budget are made available at the school. A public hearing is always offered for residents to ask questions or voice concerns or support.

State law sets the public vote on the proposed budget and school board elections on the third Tuesday in May. The polls are open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. in the High School gymnasium.

PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

Because the process of growing is a complicated one, parents and students often need advice. For this purpose, the District maintains a staff of professional personnel who may be contacted through the school principals or Donna Watson, Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Pupil Personnel Services, at 732-2523.

Pupil personnel services include psychological, social work, nursing, occupational, physical, speech and language, and guidance services. These services are available for all students and their families in the District and may be accessed individually or in small groups. Requests for these services are made through the Office of Pupil Personnel Services.

GUIDANCE & COUNSELING

Guidance counselors are professionally trained people who possess specific skills, knowledge and techniques used in assisting students to better understand themselves, identify and use their personal resources, make realistic educational and occupational plans, and get the most out of learning opportunities.

Staff is available to help your child through interview and consultation with teachers and parents. These interviews are important because we believe that optimal guidance can be accomplished through the cooperation of the student, home and school. Interviews may concern educational, vocational, social, ethical, or health guidance. An interview may be initiated by a student, parent, teacher, advisor, or counselor.

STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

The Committees on Special Education and Preschool Special Education are part of the Office of Pupil Personnel Services. These committees serve to ensure appropriate educational services for students who are 3 to 21 years old and have special educational and/or related services needs. The District offers a continuum of services that range from fully included classrooms within the school district to placements in Questar III BOCES and other outside agencies.

STUDENT ACCIDENT INSURANCE

The District currently maintains student accident insurance coverage through Pupil Benefits Plan Inc. of Glenville, NY. When an injury occurs to a student during any school-sponsored event, the child should immediately report it to the teacher. The teacher will direct the pupil to the school health office. The school nurse will fill out an accident report and contact the parent if medical attention appears to be needed.

Parents must inform the District within 30 days if medical attention relating to such an injury becomes necessary. All medical bills should be submitted to the parents' own health insurance carrier before any claim is filed with the District for coverage of excess costs. A claim form may be obtained from the District office to assist the parent in reporting excess costs to Pupil Benefits Plan. Pupil Benefits Plan will accept and analyze such claims and pay up to scheduled limits. All such claims must be filed within one year of the date of the accident. DISPENSING MEDICATION

It is important to clarify the rules regarding dispensing of internal medication to school children. Compliance with requests that do not follow these rules is contrary to good health practices and statutory regulations outlined in the Nurse Practice Act and provisions of State Education Law.

Internal medication will be dispensed only when the authorized permission form, available at school health offices and the school website www.schodack.k12.ny.us, is completed by the attending physician.

There are three important considerations for the family physician:

1. The child's ability to attend school.
2. The frequency of dosage of medication.
3. Medication given only as necessary.

Medication may be administered if it is accompanied by all of the following:

1. The written order of your physician specifying diagnosis, medication, possible side effects, dosage, frequency, and the time element for administering the medication as ordered.
2. The written request of the parent, requesting that school personnel administer the medication as ordered.
3. The family must provide the medication in a bottle, tube or container that clearly indicates date, name of child and physician, dosage, and frequency. An adult must transport all medication to school.

Questions about this procedure may be directed to the school nurse in each building.

HEALTH SERVICES

The Health Services Program K-12 offers a variety of services to students and their parents. Annual vision and hearing examinations are given to every student, with parents notified of any problems found and counseling and follow-up work where it is necessary. GRADE LEVEL PHYSICALS

New York State Law requires that mandatory physicals be completed BEFORE students enter kindergarten and grades 2, 4, 7, and 10. In order to remain in school, any student who does not have a completed physical when entering these grades will be scheduled for a school physical.

Sports physicals must be reviewed and signed by the school physician before a student is cleared for sports. This will be done when the school doctor is scheduled to come in prior to each season. It is very important that physicals be done by that time. Students are repeatedly informed of the dates. The signing of these physicals will be handled through the Health Office.

Also, before entering grade 6, students must have verification from the doctor of either having had chicken pox or receiving the varicella vaccine.

SCOLIOSIS SCREENING

Scoliosis screening is administered to all students ages 8-16. If your child is in either category and you would like your family physician to perform either of the above, please submit a physical form to the school nurse by October 1. These physicals must be dated from July 1 to October 1 to be current.



HELP STOP THE SPREAD OF THE FLU

Influenza is a highly contagious disease of the lungs that can lead to pneumonia. Each year about 36,000 people die because of the flu. Influenza is spread easily through contact with droplets from the nose and throat of a person who is coughing and/or sneezing. Symptoms include headache, fever, chills, cough or sore throat, and body aches. Although the flu is primarily a respiratory disease, vomiting and diarrhea may also occur, particularly in children. The incubation period is one to five days. A person is contagious for about a week from the day before symptoms appear.

Rest and adequate amounts of liquid are usually the only treatment for the flu, although several new drugs promising to reduce the severity of the symptoms are now on the market. The flu vaccine usually protects most people from the flu and in the cases where a vaccinated person gets the flu, symptoms are not as bad. While the best time to get the vaccine is in October or November, getting immunized later can still offer protection. Frequent hand washing, covering your mouth and nose with a tissue when you sneeze, and disinfecting surfaces can help prevent the spread of the flu.

Please remember, if your child is sick, please keep him or her home to help prevent an outbreak in school.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

In order to maintain a safe school environment, the District asks all drivers to obey all signs and painted traffic flow indicators on school grounds. For parents dropping off or picking up children, we ask parents to allow enough time to do this safely. It may be necessary for parents to wait in a line of cars for a few minutes to ensure the safety of all children.

For our children's safety, please:

- Slow down.
- Do not park in fire lanes.
- Do not pass school buses when their red lights are flashing. It is illegal to pass a bus with its red lights flashing even in the school driveway.

Use of School Facilities

The use of school facilities has increased each year as more groups and organizations request permission to use them, so the availability of the gyms and cafeterias is extremely limited. Fees are charged when a group's use has a financial impact on the District.

Prioritization of facilities use is at the discretion of the District and is set by Board policy as follows:

1. Regular K-12 programs
2. Extra-curricular/Interscholastic programs
3. Continuing/Adult Education programs and alumni activities
4. School support group programs
5. Community group activities

Applications and inquiries should be made to the Buildings and Grounds Department at 732-2831.

Care of School Property

The Schodack Central School District has a responsibility to protect school property. The District will take any and all legal action to prevent damage to or destruction of District property. In addition, the District will seek restitution from, and prosecution of, any person or persons who willfully damage school property.

Organizations using school athletic fields and individuals attending athletic contests must park in the school parking lots. Cars should not be parked on school lawn areas.

South Schodack Road is extremely unsafe for parking and has been posted for no parking. Vehicles must not be driven on lawns to access athletic fields.

- The roadway directly behind the high school must be kept free of vehicles in case of emergencies.
- Skateboarding is not permitted on school grounds.
- Those using the high school track must wear appropriate footwear. No motorized vehicles, bicycles, baby carriages, etc., are permitted on the track, as they damage the track surface.
- People who walk or exercise their dogs on school property must pick up any animal waste their pet may leave as it may transmit diseases.

Soccer Field Safety Policy

In response to concerns about foot traffic in and around the bus garage area, the Board of Education has adopted a policy regarding access to the soccer fields behind the Middle School. In particular, the pathway used by students, staff, and visitors to access the soccer fields located behind the bus garage could present a potentially hazardous situation due to the proximity of the bus garage where bus vehicles are parked and refueled.

To reduce potential risk of injury, arrow signs have been installed marking a safe pathway to the soccer fields. Pedestrians attending soccer events at the field must use this pathway to access the soccer fields and avoid walking in or near the bus garage parking area. Visitors should also avoid parking personal vehicles in the bus garage parking area. During the soccer season and large sporting events, the designated pathway will also be roped off.

For safety reasons, the District will strictly enforce this policy. Coaches and district staff will monitor traffic patterns and reroute any pedestrians walking outside of the designated pathway.

To communicate the policy to students, staff and community members, the Board will: publish the policy annually, distribute the policy to District staff and soccer coaches, and distribute the policy to soccer team members using the fields.

SCHODACK CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

ASBESTOS INSPECTIONS

The school district is required, under rules and regulations of the federal Environmental Protection Agency in response to the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1986 (AHERA), to notify students, parents and employees of the presence of asbestos containing materials (ACM) in its buildings. Notice is hereby given that pursuant to AHERA 40 CFR Part 763 section 763.93, the District will conduct inspections, re-inspections and operations and maintenance activities designed to identify and abate ACM known to exist in its school buildings. Notice is also given that a copy of the district's Management Plan for Asbestos Abatement, together with supporting documentation, is available for inspection in the District Facilities Office.

PESTICIDE USE NOTIFICATION POLICY

New York State Education Law Section 409-H requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Schodack Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide application is not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72 hours following an application
- Anti-microbial products
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper-resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- Nonvolatile insecticide baits in tamper-resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate

SMOKING/USE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS

Schodack Central School District has a smoke-free environment. Consistent with state and federal law, Schodack Central School District prohibits the use of cigarettes and any other tobacco products by students, staff, parents, visitors, and vendors in school buildings, administrative offices, bus garages, school buses, on school grounds, or at any school-sponsored event, wherever it may occur.

The use of tobacco in any form is hazardous and harmful to the health of students and is not permitted by students in school, on school property, or in areas which are in view of the school, including roadways and neighboring property and homes unless it is the student's primary place of residence. This includes time before school, while school activities are taking place,

- The application of EPA-designated biopesticides
- The application of EPA-designated exempt materials under 40 CFR 152.25
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect an individual from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good-faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

You must request in writing if you would like to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school. and after school. Violation of this school rule will be cumulative from one school year to the next.

In addition to school penalties, the student will be reported to the Rensselaer County Department of Health and will be subject to a fine for violating the New York State Clean Air Act. The possession of tobacco products in school by students is also prohibited. If there is a reasonable suspicion that a student possesses tobacco products, the principal may search the student's locker, car, possessions, or person and will notify parents of suspected tobacco product use. A student who possesses tobacco products, lighters, or matches will have these items confiscated. Specific disciplinary actions that will be taken for violating this rule are included in the Code of Conduct.
