# School Year Starts Tuesday, September 7

Schodack students return for the 2010-11 school year on Tuesday, September 7 with some significant changes including a new superintendent, high school principal and fifth grade moving to CES.

Superintendent Robert Horan, who started July 1 after five years as MHHS Principal, noted there will also be changes at the state level, including higher proficiency standards for state exams and uncertainty about state education aid.

But Mr. Horan stressed the district will keep the community informed of the impact of any changes. He encouraged community members to contact the district whenever they have a question or concern.

"Many in the community may know me already but if you don't, please know my door is always open," Mr. Horan said. "We want to hear from you whenever you have a question or concern."

Ron Agostinoni succeeds Mr. Horan this year as MHHS Principal. Mr. Agostinoni thanked the community for the warm welcome he's already received (see page 7). He noted one initiative he'll explore this year is more opportunities for students to earn high school and college credit through college in the high school courses.


"I'm looking forward to the new year and continuing to meet more parents and students," Mr. Agostinoni said. "I encourage parents to stop by my office whenever they're here." At CES, fifth grade moves from MHMS as last year's fourth graders stay in their elementary school. Principal Jason Chevrier explained the move keeps fifth grade in an elementary setting.

The move also provides the school greater flexibility in scheduling, which is essential after the unfortunate staffing reductions the district was forced to make last year to reduce spending. As CES reallocates its resources to continue its focus on the delivery of academics, CES will make a change to Morning Program, offering it once a month (see page 2).

"Morning Program is a great program and I understand parents may be disappointed that we'll be offering it once a month," Mr. Chevrier said. "But this change will help us focus our resources on academics and what's ultimately best for our children's education."

At MHMS, Wildcat Pride – the school's character education program – will continue to be a focus. With the school now grades 6-8, Principal Michael Bennett explained MHMS will look more to a junior high school model that promotes independent learning to prepare students for high school.

"The one thing that won't change is the education we're providing students," Mr. Bennett said. "It continues to be about our students and providing them the best education we can. We'll continue to take that student-centered approach at the Middle School."



### **Congratulations Class of 2010!**

The Schodack CSD community celebrated the achievements of its newest class of alumni on June 25 as the district held its 55th Annual Commencement Ceremony for 95 members of the Class of 2010.

Robert Horan, High School Principal at the time of the event, told parents he knew exactly how they were feeling watching their children graduate as his son also graduated.

"I can honestly say that I am just as proud of each and every one of you as I am of him," Mr. Horan told graduates. "You've really made it tough for those that have to follow in your footsteps. To tell you the truth, I honestly don't want to see you leave."

Graduates went on to such colleges as Brown University, Clarkson University, Cornell University, Emerson College, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and SUNY Binghamton.

# Changes to CES Morning Program

In an effort to spend more time and resources on the delivery of academics, Castleton Elementary School will hold Morning Program once a month this year instead of each day.

"I certainly understand that parents may be disappointed by this change. This was a difficult decision to make because I know how much parents enjoy seeing their children during Morning Program," said Principal Jason Chevrier. "But I think this change will help our children academically and ultimately is best for our entire student body."

Mr. Chevrier explained that as a result of the unfortunate staffing reductions the district was forced to make last year to reduce spending, the school has to determine how to best utilize the talents of its faculty in a different way to ensure delivery of the

high-quality educational programs the community expects.

"I am confident that we will once again have a great school year filled with student successes and outstanding events while building a sense of community within our school," Mr. Chevrier said.

Mr. Chevrier stressed that parents will still be able to see their children during the Monthly Morning Assemblies scheduled each month.

"The Monthly Morning Assemblies will provide opportunities to showcase students, promote a positive and safe learning environment and provide students the opportunity to present in front of a large audience," Mr. Chevrier said.

# TAX LEVY SET FOR 2010-11

The Schodack CSD Board of Education set the tax levy for the 2010-11 school year at its August 19 meeting at \$10,482,894, a 0.18 percent decrease from the 2009-10 tax levy of \$10,501,739.

The projected tax rates (per \$1,000 of assessed value) are \$18.83657 for town of Schodack residents and \$18.836519 for town of Stuyvesant residents.

While the school district is collecting slightly less money in total property taxes, many residents will see an increase in taxable assessed value, and therefore a higher percentage increase in school taxes, due to a decline in the BASIC and Enhanced STAR exemptions.

The STAR exemptions are set entirely by New York State and the school district has no control over any changes to those exemption levels.

# New Online Cafeteria Payment System

This school year, parents can deposit money in their children's school meal accounts through a new secure online payment system.

To use the new system, visit the school website, www.schodack.k12.ny.us, and click on the "Food Services" link on the left side of the screen. On the Food Services webpage parents will find a link to the online payment system and instructions.

The new online system also provides parents the ability to view their children's account balance and print out a copy of their eating history report, including dates and times that students purchased a breakfast and/or lunch within the past 30 days.

Parents who prefer to use the existing system of paying by check can continue to do so. Parents are asked to continue to make checks out to "Schodack Central School District" and write your child's full name on the check.

## Answer to Question About Maple Hill MS

With the move of fifth grade to Castleton Elementary School, Schodack CSD has received questions from community members about the future of Maple Hill Middle School.

"I want to assure our community that we have no plans to close Maple Hill Middle School at this time," said Superintendent Robert Horan. "We value the school and its role in our students' education. We've started some initiatives that we hope will reverse enrollment trends and help the entire district."

During last year's budget discussions, the possibility of eventually closing the Middle School was discussed as the district grappled with how to reduce spending while enrollment continued to decrease.

But Mr. Horan emphasized that the discussion was only part of an overall look at all cost saving options, including vacating a corridor of the Middle School this year to save on custodial and energy costs as fifth grade faculty and staff move to CES.

To help address declining enrollment the district is actively encouraging more families to move into the district. On



Aug. 31, the district invited realtors into Schodack schools for a walkthrough to highlight the outstanding programs and opportunities for students and community members. A village wide garage sale and farmer's market is also planned for Sept. 11 at CES with realtors committing to hosting open houses throughout the district that day.

Principal Michael Bennett assured parents that the district believes strongly


in the Middle School and will do everything it can to preserve it.

"The role of the Middle School in education and what happens here as our children grow and build a sense of self is vital," Mr. Bennett said. "If we get to a point we have to discuss the future of the school and alter how we educate our students, we will have strong community engagement to hear the thoughts and concerns of our community."

### District Calendar Available Online

### District Switches to Automated Phone System

The Schodack CSD has switched to an automated phone system this year that helps callers reach the office they need more quickly anytime of the day.

The new system, which is a feature of the school's telephone system and does not require any additional expense, allows callers to reach frequently requested offices such as the nurse's office, the guidance office or the transportation department by selecting from a short menu.

Parents and community residents still call the same number for each school building that they have used in the past. For callers who would prefer not to use the automated system, they will be transferred to the building's main office automatically if they do not select an option.

Superintendent Robert Horan said the new system is necessary as the district has less clerical staff due to reductions in that area in the 2010-11 school budget. But Mr. Horan noted the system should make it easier for callers to reach the office they need, even before school opens if they want to leave a message with the nurse's office, for example, to report their student will be out sick before going to work.

"This will make better use of our resources and it doesn't cost the district a penny," Mr. Horan said.

# General Information and Registration

**Eligibility** — Registration is open to all residents of the Schodack Central School District. Nonresidents may enroll in courses on a space-available basis.

Senior Citizens — District residents who are age 60 or older may attend many courses tuition free or at a reduced rate. Courses that are not free or offered at a reduced rate are noted in the course description. All materials fees are the responsibility of the participant.

Continuing Education is selfsupporting, with no bearing on the district's tax rate. It is only through the continuing support of the community that this program is possible.

Fees — All course fees must be paid by the first course meeting. Registrations are binding because financial commitments are made based on the number of registrants for each course. We are sorry, but no refunds will be made unless the class is canceled due to insufficient enrollment or the class is filled to maximum capacity. Each class must meet a minimum enrollment. If a course is canceled due to insufficient enrollment, or over-enrolled, notifications and refunds will be sent by mail.

Registration must be made in advance. Mail registrations are due by Sept. 10. On site registration is held Thursday, Sept. 9, from 6 to 7 p.m. in the Maple Hill High School lobby.

# PAVING PROJECT IMPACTS SOCCER FIELDS

A paving project at the school bus garage will mean players and spectators attending soccer games will have to park in the Middle School parking lot through the end of September.

"We apologize for any inconvenience this creates for our community," said Buildings and Grounds Superintendent Matt LaClair. "We'll mark a path to the fields so our community can easily get to the soccer fields."

The paving project is part of the Capital Project but was delayed due to the high bids the district initially received. The district rebid the project and received lower projections, agreeing to a \$310,000 bid.

The project will involve tearing up the current pavement, leveling the site to improve drainage, installing a subbase and paving the lot. A new concrete floor will also be installed in the bus garage's maintenance shop.

"The current parking lot is deteriorating and needs to be replaced. This will improve safety and ensure we meet all county and state regulations," Mr. LaClair said. "The new lot should last well into the future, likely 15 to 20 years."
