District Receives \$600,000 Grant for MHMS

Schodack CSD has been tentatively awarded a \$600,000 grant from the State Education Department to create a program at the Middle School over the next three years that will expand learning opportunities for students.

The district is one of only a few in the region to be awarded the competitive grant and was the only district out of 22 component school districts in Questar III's three-county (Rensselaer, Columbia and Greene) region to apply for the funding.

"This is great news for our students at Maple Hill Middle School and throughout our district," said Superintendent Bob Horan. "The funding will help us build on the enhanced educational opportunities we started this past year at the Middle School."

The grant will provide \$200,000 in each of the next three years to develop a program specifically for the Middle School. The competitive grant program was part of last year's state aid that required districts to create a specific proposal to receive the funding. The grant will become final

once the Office of the State Comptroller and Division of Budget sign off on it.

Mr. Horan credited the work of Middle School Principal Michael Bennett and Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Pupil Personnel Services Donna Watson for putting together the eight-page proposal.

"Mike and Donna put in a lot of hours developing a detailed program for the Middle School that will help our stu-

> dents become better writers, readers and expand STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) opportunities," Mr. Horan said.

In order to qualify for the grant, the district had to select one of four areas to target. Mr. Horan said the Middle School was selected to help students be more prepared for High School and help with the transition to those grades.

"While the program is targeted for the Middle School, the grant funding to support these opportunities for students will really help the entire school district," Mr. Horan said.



Districts Decide Not to Move Forward With Merger

A fter studying the Merger Feasibility Report and listening to community members at public forums, the Schodack and Ichabod Crane CSD Boards of Education have decided not to pursue a merger this year.

Superintendent Bob Horan explained that the report showed merging the two districts would increase taxes significantly for Ichabod Crane residents due to a difference in tax rates on true value between the two communities.

"We've said all along that a merger had to do two key things: maintain or increase student opportunities and reduce costs," said Mr. Horan. "Because it didn't reduce costs for Ichabod Crane residents, a merger doesn't make sense at this time."

If the districts decide in the next two years to look at a merger again, Mr. Horan noted that the study could still be used. He added that the study, which is available on the

district website, includes detailed data about finances, demographics, programming and much more that is still useful to both districts.

Ichabod Crane CSD Interim Superintendent Lee Bordick noted that the conversations about a merger already have led to positive relationships and opportunities to work together.

"One of the many positive outcomes of the merger study is the establishment of a close working relationship between the Ichabod Crane and Schodack School Districts' Administrative Staffs and Boards of Education," Mr. Bordick said. "I anticipate many creative program opportunities being developed in the next year or two because of that collaboration."

"We want to sincerely thank the members of our committee who put so much time and effort into this study," added Mr. Horan. "Their dedication to their communities was outstanding."

School Lunches Healthier This Year

This school year, school lunches at Schodack CSD will offer a larger variety of vegetables, less sodium and no trans fats as part of new school meal requirements set by the USDA.

Food Services Director Tom McNay noted the schools' lunches already offer whole grain and locally grown vegetables but that the new changes will make lunches even healthier.

"We are dedicated to providing quality nutritious meals that students will enjoy and choose to eat," said Mr. McNay. "We hope parents will encourage their students to try new fruits and vegetables."



The cost of breakfast will remain \$1 but lunches will increase by 10 cents to \$2 at CES and \$2.15 at MHMS and MHHS. The increases are necessary to meet rising food prices, the new school meal requirements and to keep the food services budget self-sustaining without support from the general budget.

New Teacher and Principal Evaluations This Year

C tarting this school year, all teachers and principals will be O evaluated annually as part of New York State's Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) requirements.

The statewide evaluation system, which requires reviews based in part on measures of student achievement, was phased in last year for classroom teachers of English Language "The evaluations will Arts and Math for grades 4-8 as well as their principals. This year, it will expand to include all teachers and principals.

"Our administrators have trained extensively to become certified Lead Teacher Evaluators. Beginning this fall, they will be in classrooms observing teachers and students more than ever," said Superintendent Bob Horan. "That's good because that's where they should be. Parents also need to know that principals will not be as available as they have been in the past given the time involved for all these evaluations."

Mr. Horan noted that classroom observations are not a new practice in Schodack schools, as they historically have been a major component of the evaluation process for non-tenured teachers. In addition, administrators perform periodic unannounced drop-in observations of tenured teachers. New York State is now mandating many more observations and the use of rubrics outlining the specific criteria to be used.

The process requires administrators to first meet with each teacher to discuss the lesson for the class which will be observed. Next, the principal observes the teacher in the classroom, taking evidence-based notes to document teaching practice. A post-observation meeting is then

required to discuss the observation. Principals will then have to file paperwork with the state for each teacher.

"The evaluations will be evidence-

saying a teacher is doing a great job, they have to provide detail as to what the teacher did in the classroom."

Teachers will also be required to write Student Learning Objectives (SLOs), which will detail what they expect their students to learn by the end of the year. All SLOs will have a pre-test and a post-test. The assessment will determine if student growth was achieved for that specific course. The SLO's are also used as part of the APPR.

In the end, each teacher will receive a composite effectiveness score, out of a total of 100 possible points.

Principals will similarly be evaluated each year by the school superintendent. Principal performance will be connected to teacher and student performance.

District Ranked #15 in Capital Region



Schodack CSD was ranked #15 out of 87 school districts in the Capital Region in the Business Review's annual "School Reports Publication" published in June.

The school rankings are based on New York State Education Department performance measures for language and reading, social studies, science, math, and graduation results.

Schodack moved up two spots from #17 last year. It was the second highest ranked dis-

trict in Rensselaer County. Most of the districts scoring higher than Schodack were much larger districts.

Despite the high academic ranking, Schodack CSD ranked #46 in per pupil spending, below the state average for spending.

Common Core Learning Standards Guide Instruction

The standards are part of a national effort to provide a clearer understanding of what students are expected to learn so that teachers and parents can better prepare them for college or the workforce.

Common Core Learning Standards were an initiative led by the



National Governors Association for Best Practices and the Council of Chief State School Officers. The standards have been adopted by most states across the country, including New York.

As a result, public school districts are changing what they teach and how they teach to align curriculum with the Common Core Learning Standards.

In New York State, the standards apply to English Language Arts and Mathematics for pre-kindergarten through grade 12. The standards also will be the basis of the state assessments beginning with the new school year.

District Newsletters Earn National Awards

he district's budget newsletter and regular newsletter have been honored with national awards for excellence in communications.


CHINESE LANGUAGE AND CULTURE II

Last year, as part of the district's efforts to reduce costs in the face of state aid cuts, school officials proposed replacing the modified sports program with an organized intramural program.

But the Maple Hill Athletic Booster Club offered to raise the additional money needed to support the program through fundraising efforts. Over the sum-



mer, for example, the Booster Club held a dinner/cruise and has an October 8 raffle scheduled.

Tax Levy Set for 2012-13

The Board of Education set the 2012-13 tax levy at its August 16 meeting at \$11,771,071, a 2.47% increase over the previous year.

Tax rates (per \$1,000 of assessed values) are \$20.011435 for Schodack and \$21.445923 for Stuyvesant.

While the total tax levy (the amount the district collects in taxes) increased by 2.47%, the tax rate for Schodack increased by 3.15%.

The discrepancy is largely a result of the total assessed value of properties in the town decreasing due to an agreement between Hannaford and the town of Schodack to reduce the value of the company's distribution center on Route 9 from \$38.7 million to \$28.3 million to settle a lawsuit filed by Hannaford.

"Essentially, Hannaford now has a smaller piece of the pie and other taxpayers have to share a larger portion of the tax burden," explained Monica Kim, Director of Business and Support Services.

The tax rate for Stuyvesant, however, increased by 10.55% because Schodack's equalization rate was higher than 100%, meaning the market value of properties within the Town of Schodack was less than their assessed value. Properties within Stuyvesant held their value so their equalization rate stayed at 100%. As a result, Stuyvesant's share of the tax levy increased. Equalization rates, like property assessments, are set by New York State, not the school district.

We also want our community to be aware that the state cap on STAR savings for homeowners, which went into effect last year, is still in effect this year. A homeowner can receive no more than a 2% increase in STAR savings than they received the previous year.



The results of the Castleton Elementary School online parent survey that was conducted in May is now available on the school's website.

"I would like to sincerely thank all our parents who shared their thoughts about our school," said Principal Jason Chevrier. "The responses were incredibly insightful and we'll use them to build on our successes and improve areas where parents shared concerns."

The survey was offered online for two weeks in May. The district received a total of 106 responses.

Mr. Chevrier stressed how appreciative the school is of the responses, but he noted that the school is also being careful with the results because the survey sample size was relatively small and the views of all parents were therefore not represented.

"We value every single response," Mr. Chevrier said. "But there are a lot of parents that we didn't hear from so we need to be careful not to take these results as necessarily reflective of all our parents. If parents ever have a comment or concern, we ask that they please let us know."
